# Albemarle College — <u>www.albemarle.org.uk</u>

The founders, Beverley Mellon and James Eytle, had experience working at private colleges in London and wanted to set up one of their own. They approached David Game in the mid-1990s and he agreed to assist in setting up this high-level Mayfair institution.

# David Game College — <u>www.davidgamecollege.com</u>

This was David Game's flagship college, founded in 1974 as a private tutorial service. It is now in large premises in Notting Hill Gate. David is the Principal.

## Kensington Academy of English — <u>www.kensingtonacademy.com</u>

KAE was founded by David Game in 1978. Recognised by the British Council, it teaches English at all levels, year-round, including popular summer courses. Kensington Academy of English (KAE) is a trading name and is a British Council accredited division of David Game College. David is the Principal.

Started in 2001 by David Game, who appointed the current principals. He provided the building and start-up capital through a not-for-profit Trust. The LFA teaches specialised short courses and a one-year diploma in film production.

Two colleagues of David Game wanted to found a centre of excellence for education in acting. In 2004 David provided the premises and a start-up fund. The School is a division of David Game College.

LSP was acquired by David Game in 1993. Together with his Vice-Principal, John Dalton, he relaunched and re-branded the School, which now offers popular evening courses in publishing.

## London School of Public Relations — <u>www.lspr-education.com</u>

A professional, independent PR school was the vision of David's Vice-Principal, John Dalton, who devised and launched it in 1994. LSPR has recently expanded its London courses to cover international relations and security issues, offering a variety of services to mainly foreign clients. It successfully set up franchises in Eastern Europe and Asia.

### Notting Hill Tutors — <u>www.nottinghill-tutors.co.uk</u>

Founded by David Game in 2013, NHT offers outside-hours tuition in GCSE and A-level during evenings, weekends and Easter holidays. NHT is a division of David Game College, with classes held in the main college building.

#### Westminster Tutors — <u>www.westminstertutors.co.uk</u>

Established 1934 and acquired by DG in 1992, this independent college is run from premises in South Kensington. Westminster Tutors delivers A-level and GCSE tuition in small classes of 1-3 people. Westminster Tutors is a trading name and is a division of David Game College.

DGHE was set up in 2013 to deliver Higher Education courses, following a government initiative. It is managed by one of David's senior colleagues and will be expanded to offer full degree courses in the coming years. It is a division of David Game College.

# Abacus College, Oxford — <u>www.abacuscollege.co.uk</u>

David Game acquired a share of Abacus in 1998. Founded by Roland Hazel a decade earlier, Abacus offers courses in A-level, University Foundation and English language courses. The College now operates as a 'not-for-profit' organisation but Mr Game retains a keen interest in its development.

Bath Academy was established in the 1990s by David Game and a local academic partner, within the premises of another successful college. It soon moved to new dedicated premises and now offers A-level, GCSE, University Foundation and English language.

### Bosworth Independent College, Northampton — <u>www.bosworth-college.co.uk</u>

Bosworth, a college offering full-board, was acquired by David Game in 1988, who then appointed Mark Broadway as director. Since then, it has expanded from 40 to 320 students, offering A-levels, GCSES, English language and University Foundation programmes.

OLC is a division of Abacus College and operates as its British Council accredited English language department.

In 2003, the executive team at Cavendish College London approached David Game with a proposal for the development of a network of higher education colleges in Africa.

The Cavendish University campuses in Zambia and Uganda were founded in 2004 and 2007 respectively and now offer a range of undergraduate and postgraduate degree courses to over 7000 students.

DGMS was established with former colleagues from London in 2010, who wanted to set up a British business school in Thailand.
